Details about The Fourth Edition

The ASAM Criteria provides national standards for conducting a comprehensive, multidimensional patient assessment and for determining the appropriate level of care for adult patients with addiction and co-occurring conditions. The criteria are evidence-based, outcome-oriented and focus on results-based care across the continuum of care – placement, continued stay, transfer or discharge.

A key priority in the Fourth Edition is to present the criteria and standards so they are easier to understand and implement by providers, treatment programs, health plans and managed care organizations. This will include providing more standardized tools; clearly delineating the assessment and treatment planning process; defining critical subdimensions that should be assessed; and organizing the admission criteria to clarify which dimensions need to show improvement to support transition to a less intensive level of care.

In the Fourth Edition, ASAM is removing standards and admission criteria for adolescents and for individuals within jails and prisons (justice-involved individuals). Instead, ASAM will release individual volumes over the next 2 years in order to better reflect evolving treatment standards and provide sufficient detail for these audiences.
